Ann Patrick's Director's corner – issues in alerting and bid explanations

Alert promptly and clearly. Don't stop to think about your own response first. Do not explain the alert unless your opponent's ask.

Do not ask for an explanation of an alert until it is your turn to bid.

Do not ask for an explanation of an alert unless you are considering making a bid yourself.

Any concerns at the table please call the director.

If, when asked for an explanation, you do not know or are not sure of the meaning of a bid, please say so!

- Do not say "I take it to mean..." This is giving your partner unauthorised information.
- Call the director ("director please") and you will be asked to leave the table so your partner can give the explanation.

Please note the following changes to the Club's event calendar:


- The proposed Novice Congress has been cancelled

The following competitions are scheduled for the next three months at WCBC:


- GNO Teams (BAWA competition) Mondays March 13-27

Interesting hands – bidding

A couple of recent hands from Club events.



West opens 1NT and east falls off their chair! Regardless of whether north or south interrupt south needs to think that slam is likely and should investigate through some form of keycard (e.g. transfer to diamonds followed by 4D OR an immediate call of 4C – CRO). Finding two aces with west, east can now ask for kings and finding the KC bids 7NT (hoping that neither opposition hand holds four diamonds to the J) or 6NT if they are serial pessimists.



This is for DONT devotees. East opened 1NT (I don't like it but some do). What should south do? It's a three-loser and 20 point hand so there aren't many points left for west and north. My partner bid 4H, which I passed, thinking he wanted to play in hearts and we went down. With a 5:5 hand in hearts and spades sitting over a weak 1NT opening it's probably reasonable to bid: 2H (with 11-17 points and a 7-loser); 3H (with a 5-loser) and 4H (with a 3-loser). Playing DONT if partner had a long strong heart suit and wanted to play in 4H they should double first and then respond to the 2C relay with 4H.
